



### Two Similar Haliotis Species

Two abalone species from Australia are featured in this issue of *The Beauii*. The first is *Haliotis scalaris scalaris* (Leach, 1814). Found out of SW Australia this species common name(s) are "Staircase" or "Ridged Ear Abalone. Looking at the photograph (and looking at the real specimen) reveals the interesting characteristics of this shell which lends it the name of staircase. **Figure 1**

The prominent details of the sculpture make this one of the easiest *Haliotis* species to identify. It is a vegetarian and lives under stones.

The second species is *Haliotis scalaris emmae* Reeve, 1846. Likewise it is found under rocks and also from Australia but more from the Southern portion. This particular species is known as "Emma's Abalone." **Figure 2**




Figure 3. Color patterns of the *Haliotis scalaris*.

Both species can present with similar coloration (rust to red to cream). **Figure 3** is a plate from Geiger & Owen's 2012 *Abalone—Worldwide Haliotidae* showing the various color patterns of the *Haliotis scalaris*.

Haliotis scalaris can be found on Ebay with prices ranging from \$18 to \$125. There will probably be some for sale at the Sarasota Shell Club's Shell Show. **Figure 4** shows this species, along with three other shells commoranting light houses—interesting the abalone is featured by a set of stamps produced by the Central African Republic.

The *Haliotis* species are most interesting. An exhibit of them should be at our shell show.


### A Postcard from the Past . . .

My Heart is like a Shell Whose vague commotion Echoes the Mighty Swell Of Loves great Ocean!



### Carefree Learner Excursion

### Report by Duane Kauffmann

On Monday, January 27, nine SSC members braved the 57 degree temperature for a trip to the flats in Sarasota Bay. Since by all accounts (including research) the extended red tide event (18 months) had a devastating effect on local marine life, this trip was an opportunity to see what could be found nearly a year after the retreat of *Karenia brevis*. It did not take long to determine that molluscan life was still

suffering. Although I did not see everyone's discoveries, live gastropods were scarce. I found one banded tulip (*Cinctura lilium*) trying to make a meal from an empty pen shell *Atrina* 



seminuda. In the micros domain, I found abundant *Bittiolum varium* and several *Astyris lunata*, but nothing else. [Note: the



pictured *Bittiolum varium*, left photo, is from the Florida Keys. It is of interest to note that the *Bittiolum* from Sarasota Bay are invariably smaller and much darker

in color, being very dark brown or black, than the light tan, 5 mm shells from the Keys.]

Live *Chione elevata* (Cross-barred Venus) were found with some frequency, and there were numerous shells of colorful fresh-dead *Dinocardium robustum* (Giant Atlantic Cockle).

Since Megan Ehlers was looking for live invertebrates to share with her high school students, a number of SSC members joined in the search (a special thanks to those members for a number of the finds



mentioned). In this venture there was encouraging success. Although numbers were not large, a variety of specimens made it to the onboard aquarium. Among these were the spider crab *Libinia dubia*, mud crabs in the genus *Paneopus*, one small decorator crab (*Microphrys bicornutus*, picture at left) and

many small crabs of low profile, perhaps in the genus *Petrolisthes*.

A variety of small shrimp were captured, including very slender bright green grass shrimp of the genus *Tozeuma* 

and an attractive, yet-to-be-identified red-lined shrimp (see photos at right).



A recently dead large hermit crab (*Petrochirus diogenes*) was found in a depauperate lightning whelk (*Sinistrofulgur sinistrum*). Numerous small sea hares were seen, sluggish from the cool water. Several urchins and

anemones were found along with one small brittle star.

One of the more intriguing finds was an off-color orange-red shell of the fighting conch *Strombus alatus*. Closer inspection showed this strange color was due to the presence of a boring sponge (*Cliona delitrix*). Boring sponge larvae attach to a source of calcium such as a mollusk shell. The growing sponge is able to chemically weaken and remove very small chips from the shell, over time boring an extensive network of "burrows" in the shell (think termites and wood). The sponge expands into the vacated shell

openings. Eventually the mollusk dies. The sponge lives inside the shell until dies (as per the shell we found) or it has exhausted its home and the shell disintegrates. Then the sponge becomes free living until it perishes. One can tell if a shell has boring sponge if is not a normal color (it may be orange, orange-red, or yellow), has numerous small holes in the surface, is much too light in weight, and can be easily broken. Below are photographs of the upper part of the shell that was found and a close-up showing the holes created by the sponge.



As I returned to the dock. I was encouraged to have seen more invertebrate life than I found on a Carefree Learner trip last year. Marine species can be resilient if we humans give them a chance, but the multivariate dynamics of warming water, greater acidity, various pollutants, and other variables yet to be identified, make the prognosis guarded at best. Sad perhaps, but inevitable?

### Historian's Report

50 Years Historian's Report to February, 2020 SSC meeting

### 50 Years Ago

The February 12, 1970 meeting of the Sarasota Shell Club was held at the Palmer Bank Building with 30 members and guests present.

The Treasurer's report showed a bank balance of \$1396.17

The minutes give no mention of a program. Apparently discussion of the shell show took all the meeting time. Show is to be at the Armory. Volunteers are needed [Editorial note: sounds familiar]. The security guard will cost \$20 per night ("up from last year").

### 25 Years Ago

The meeting of February 9, 1995 was held at Mote Marine. Five guests were present. No treasurer's report, treasurer absent.

Sign-up sheet for shell show volunteers was circulated. Field trip to Marco Island was productive. Program by Jean Evans on *Melongena corona*.

[Note: at a board meeting later in the month, it was noted that it is club policy to not let the treasury balance fall below \$5,000. "This is to insure that we have enough money to cover the expenses of the shell show, in case of a disaster."]

### Sarasota Shell Club Meeting Minutes January 9, 2020

- 1. Call to order: The meeting was called to order at 7:03 P.M. by the President, Sally Peppitoni.
- 2. Introduction and Welcome: Sally welcomed everyone including two visitors, Debbie Alexander who moved here from Dublin, Ohio and Sherry who is a studio jewelry artist who works with shells.
- 3. Program: "Living Creatures of the Florida Keys" was presented by Duane Kaufmann.
- 4. Secretary's Report: Everyone received a copy of minutes from December 12, 2019 and members reviewed and made corrections. Angela Lampongna presented motion to accept minutes and Mary Jo Bopp seconded the motion. This was unanimously passed.
- 5. Treasurer's Report: Karen Huether presented financial report for January 9, 2020. (See attachment) It also can be reviewed in the Beauii. This was unanimously passed.
- 6. Corresponding Secretary's Report: Duane Kauffmann reported there was no information to report.

### 7. Committee Reports:

- A. Shell Show: The Board has taken over running the Shell Show. We need volunteers to help. On the Tuesday before the show trucks need to be loaded at 2:00 pm at the Artisan's location at Bee Ridge Presbyterian Church at Proctor and Macintosh.
- The truck needs to be unloaded at 9:00 Wednesday. We also need people to be available at the end of the day, Sunday, to breakdown, load and unload truck. People are needed to put tablecloths on tables on the Wednesday before the show. Building will be open at 10:00. Carol Mae is in charge of the refreshments and thanked Bruce for sign in sheets. Some things that have been donated are veggie and fruit tray, water, and chips. Consider things like cookie trays, regular and diet sodas or unsweetened or sweetened ice tea. \$5.00 lunches will be available Friday, Saturday and Sunday. There will be coffee, tea and water. Put your name on bottles if you bring them. Dealers and guests will pay five dollars also. We will need to know ahead of time so we can accommodate them. Bruce will be sending a note out. To remain a unified club we need help for Shell Show. Call Carol Mae if you can help with food donations and call Nancy Cadieux to volunteer to help for Shell Show.
  - B. Programs: There will be no program for the meeting after the Shell Show. We will bring members up to date about the show. If you bought something at the show bring it to the meeting to show.

There was no interest in the Peanut Island trip so Sally will find another field trip for April.

- H. Newsletter: Ron Bopp also reminded us to send in pictures and stories for the newsletter. Submit pictures and articles you may have to Ron.
- I. Education: Gill Hodges presented the shell of the month. Gordon F. will present the shell of the month at the next meeting.
- J. Sunshine: Frankie Grover had no information to report.
- K. Artisans: Donna K. reported that shells have been packed and organized for the show. Come join and see what they are doing. Come and work at the show.

  They meet weekly on Thursday starting at 10:00 am at Bee Ridge Presbyterian Church at Proctor and Macintosh.

Old Business: The Constitution and By-Laws were amended and typed out by Lynn Gaulin. Bruce will put them on the website for membership only.
