Hey All!

I've been thinking about our Carefree Learner trips into Sarasota Bay. We are so fortunate to have this opportunity available to us. Captain Bobby is always so helpful in getting some of us on and off the boat and is very generous with his time. However, the boat is quite old, and the Coast Guard says it must be scrapped and replaced. Megan



Ehlers, who arranges our trips and works for the school district says that they have recently received a grant for \$250,000 toward a replacement because of the history and legacy involving our club. This is great news. We need to always remember that a big part of our mission is to educate upcoming generations on the importance of understanding the marine environs and how they affect our lives.

Thursday, January 30th, was our last Carefree Learner trip for the season and possibly the last on that particular boat. (Photo on page 4) During the trip, we saw much of why we like to go on these shelling trips. We saw a huge horse conch in the process of chowing down on a lightning whelk, several groups of whelks, and some groups of tulips "getting it on" to make more little whelks and tulips. I found a live tulip inside a large dead whelk laying her egg sacks. There were sea stars and sea urchins, anemone tube worms, and jellies to watch. Someone even brought back a cute little puffer fish for the viewing tanks. We even saw some dolphins feeding in the shallows on our way back to the marina. All of these things, and more, are what the students later that afternoon would be able to see and learn about.

I sometimes think we take these things for granted. Most people have never seen live mollusks in their natural habitat. Many don't even understand that the mollusk creates the shell it lives in. They don't see the interconnection of the living creatures in the water and our lives, how we eat from the sea, how we play in the sea, and how it sustains us mentally and emotionally as well as physically. If we lose understanding of our connection to the sea and the creatures in it, we lose us too.

I was lucky to have my good friend, Paul Jones, from the Jacksonville Club, come as my guest on this last trip and he was



suitably impressed by the variety of sea life found in our bay. He acquired lots a great shells and was very happy to have a number of comparison species to add to his collection from other areas of the state. In April, when we go on our field trip to the St. Augustine area, he has said he will take us to some good spots he knows for shelling. Can't wait for that!


#### **Library Notes**

On January 29, 19 members of the SSC made an early morning trip to Keewaydin Island with Hemingway Water Shuttle. I was proud of everyone for showing up on time. The boat was actually able to depart before 6:30 am. This placed us on the island just as dawn was breaking. It was slack tide, and the water was perfectly calm and clear.

- \* There were some treacherous spots where waders sank into the sand above their knees. This was a perfect example of why it's a good idea to keep a couple of other shellers nearby.
- \* There were some amazing finds. Chris McDevitt got a Rose Murex with a deep red hue. Mitch Gowland came up with Wentletraps and Dwarf Olives. Jet Davis found a large Horse Conch in perfect condition. Gary Martinez discovered a gorgeous deep red 6" True Tulip. #### **Do Your Shells Need a Doctor?** Duane Kauffmann

Have you noted a white, moldy, or salt-like substance on any of your shells? If so, the shell doctor will quickly provide a diagnosis of **Byne's Disease**. Who would have imagined that a body, quite dead, such as a seashell could be sick?

So what is Byne's Disease (or more precisely Bynesian decay)? Described more than 100 years ago by a man named Loftus St. George Byne, the white salt on a shell is the result of improper storage. The problem is an unfortunate outcome when acidic vapor comes in contact with the calcium carbonate of which your shell is made. This corroding encounter damages the shell when the acidic vapor "eats into" the shell creating the white salt. While seldom "fatal" (that is the shell completely disintegrates into white dust), the disease will leave the shell pitted and scarred.


From whence cometh the damaging acidic vapor. From a whole range of cellulose-based materials,



including, but not limited to, paper, wood, cardboard, cotton, and cork. Even at room temperature, these materials give off acidic vapors. Those are the unseen "germs" that degrade stored shells.

So what to do? If a mild case, brush off the precipitate under running water. Dry and move to a glass, metal, or plastic (e.g., rigid storage boxes or Ziploc bags) location. A more advanced case may require soaking in fresh water for a day or two before brushing and drying.

An online search will lead to a detailed Wikipedia article and a link to a very practical American Conchologist article.

## **The Experience**



- With easy access from I-95, and conveniently located in the Riviera Beach Marina at the Port of Palm Beach, abundant free parking is provided for those using the ferry. Follow the signs for Peanut Island Parking. Your parking pass must be purchased at the office on the dock where the ferry loads. if you pull up next to the waterfront, you can unload your gear and purchase your parking pass before you park.
- Transportation to and from the island is provided by Peanut Island Shuttle Boat. Arrive at the ferry by 9:45 am to purchase tickets for the tenminute ride. Rides leave and return every 20 minutes. The ferry costs \$20 per person for the round trip. The last trip back is at 5:00 pm
- A -0.81 ow tide will occur at approximately 3:05 pm.
- Shells may be found by beachcombing and wading in the shallow water. It is possible to walk all the way around the island. The beach consists of stretches of both sand and rocks.

## **Options**

•Snorkeling around the rocks in the sheltered snorkeling area as well as in the channel is also recommended. Visibility may be best with high tide.

•The best shelling is to be found on the extensive exposed flats at low tide. It is necessary to wade or swim a channel about four feet deep and with a significant current. This is best done with swim fins or in a group.

• Camping is available. Reservations may be made by calling Palm Beach City Parks at (561) 845-4445 or by emailing discover.pbcgov.org.
