This will be simple. It's basically the same as last year with the exception of rotation of the directors in their year of service. The following is the list to be elected:


Officers: President – Sally Peppitoni, Vice President – Karen Huether, Treasurer – Allan Banko, Secretary – Debbie McDermott


Directors rotating into a 3-year term: Donna Cassin and Guelda Wooldridge


#### **Library Notes**

#### March Meeting's Speaker

Hi Everyone, I wanted to tell you about a really fantastic speaker, I have lined up for our SSC March 13th General Meeting at 7:00 pm. Dr. Ashley Oliphant is a retired Tenured Professor of English with teaching specialties in 20th-century American Literature, the works of Ernest Hemingway, literary modernism, and rhetoric and composition. She travels all over the United States offering interactive shark tooth and seashell workshops for children and adults and presentations about her other books. She is a longtime member of the Hemingway Society and a contributor to its conferences and The Hemingway Review. Ashely is the author of seven books. These include "Shark Tooth Hunting on the Carolina Coast", "Hemingway and Bimini: The Birth of Sport Fishing at "The End of the World", "In Search of Jimmy Buffett: A Key West Revival," and her latest book to be published in 2026 "The Ultimate Shell Seeker's Guide: Building a Better Beach-Combing Strategy"(which she will share with us the highlights in her program presentation on March 13th).



Dr. Oliphant is an animal welfare advocate in her local community. As the founder of the Humane Voters of Lincoln County, she spearheaded the successful movement to end the use of the gas chamber at her county shelter. She is the chairperson of Lincoln County's Animal Services Advisory Board and has worked for years to help the shelter achieve and then maintain its No Kill designation.

In her spare time, Oliphant likes to hunt for shark teeth and seashells, garden, travel with her family (including her son Miller and her husband Chris), and float in her swimming pool. She has two cats, Irish Kevin and Tuna. Her lifelong dreams are to own a signed first edition of Hemingway's "The Old Man and the Sea" and to meet Willie Nelson.







Veterans

Memorial Beach

Horseshoe Beach

- There will be a number of shelling opportunities between Veteran's Memorial Beach and Horseshoe Beach as you can see in the first map.
- We will gather at Horseshoe Beach at

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12:00 p.m. because there is an off-road parking lot. There is a quarry on the bay side with easy snorkeling around it in grassy sea beds.

Bahia Honda State Park

The ocean side may be reached by crossing the U.S. 1. It is called the iron shore because of large areas of rugged rock near the shore. Beyond the rock is hundreds of yards of shallow water for wading and snorkeling.

## Missouri Key

- Missouri Key is the first small island across the Ohio Key channel from Bahía Honda. Pull off the roadside on either side to park. The ironshore and the channel can be accessed by going down a bank to a sandy beach. You can wade in the channel, but the current will prevent much snorkeling. You can snorkel in the grass beds offshore.
- For those wishing to get a meal after shelling, I recommend Lazy Days in Marathon.

- For lodging, it is very expensive in the Keys inMarch.
  It will be significantly less in Homestead or Florida
  City. It is approximately 90 miles or two hours depending on traffic from Homestead to Missouri Key/Horseshoe Beach.
- Bring sturdy footwear; the rocks may be sharp and slippery.
- Keep yourself wellhydrated.
- Look for Queen Conchs, cowries, and other species rarely found on the Gulf Coast.

### Monday, April 28 -1.11 low tide at 3:13 pm St. Augustine Inlet

After a fortifying meal at O'Steen's Restaurant, we will carpool to "<u>Strombis</u> Island." This will involve wading a channel where water could rise above waist deep for a short distance. On the flats and surrounding area we have a great chance of finding <u>Kiener's</u> Whelks, the orange variety of Banded Tulip, and also this is where Paul found his world record fighting conch.

In the evening we will be on our own to relax or explore the city.

We will also have some time the next morning before leaving around 2:00 pm in order to make the 14 mile drive south to <u>Matanzas</u> Inlet in time for the 3:33 pm low tide.



## **Peanut Island Debrief**

On Saturday, March 1st members of the Sarasota Shell Club disembarked from the Peanut Island Shuttle to comb the island's shores for treasures.

#### The Experience

Gary Martinez had come the day before to camp. While snorkeling he observed many live Queen Conchs, Milk Conchs, and both Florida and West Indian Fighting Conchs. At the low tide during the night, he observed live Gaudy Natica's, Giant Tuns, and even a Milky Moon Snail crawling on the sand or in shallow water. Shellers arriving the next morning circled the island. Lisa Kinney found a small Channeled Whelk, which is not generally known to occur this far south. Chris McDevitt added some large bubble shells to his collection. Nancy Cadieux came away with her first Atlantic Yellow Cowrie. The island was jammed with boats and day visitors who were already roaming the flats before they were even exposed at low tide. Saturday is probably not the best day to visit for that reason. Most of the group was ready to head back by 2:00, well before low tide.
